





#### PARENT AND CARER INFORMATION

VotesforSchools is a weekly current affairs-based voting platform designed to engage young people in political and social issues. Through weekly discussion and voting, not only are voters learning about the world around them, but they are also becoming active citizens and preparing for participating in their democratic processes as adults.

Below are some great ways for you to get involved in the conversation!

- 1. Check out their website: At 4PM every Friday, the latest VoteTopic goes live. Go to www.votesforschools.com to see what voters will be debating in the coming school week.
- 2. Discuss the topic at home: Ask your child to give arguments for each side of the debate to encourage critical thinking the weekly Home Information Sheet can help you with this. If you're not sure where to find it, please ask a member of staff to share it with you. Why not ask your child how they voted and why?
- 3. Discuss the results.
- 4. Brush up on your knowledge: read up on any topics your child is discussing or have discussed to see what your take on it is. For more sensitive topics, they also provide a List of useful resources and organisations where you or your child can find out more or seek support.
- 5. Share your ideas: Talk to your child about which issues they would like to see discussed at VotesforSchools.



## **CAREERS EDUCATION, INFORMATION, ADVICE** AND GUIDANCE

Young people are faced with a complex set of demands when preparing for their future careers. The Snaith School aims to ensure that pupils are self-confident, skilled and career-ready. This is achieved through a comprehensive programme of activities to, help them choose pathways that are right for them and sustain employability throughout their lives. Our programme starts in Year 7 through to Year 11, and is based on the nationally recognised Gatsby Benchmarks.

The programme follows the eight Gatsby Benchmarks of Good Career Guidance which are:

- A stable careers programme
- Learning from career and labour market information
- Addressing the needs of each pupil
- Linking curriculum learning to careers
- **Encounters with employers and employees**
- **Experiences of workplaces**
- **Encounters with further/higher education**



# EXTRA-CURRICULAR OPPORTUNITIES

In addition to the main curriculum, we have a range of extra-curricular clubs designed to not only encourage participation, but also stretch and challenge students of all abilities.

Although the main aim is to gain maximum participation, we also take part in a variety of individual and team fixtures in friendly, local, regional and national competitions.

In the last academic year, we took part in over two hundred fixtures in a variety of activities.









## **VISITS**

Many departments offer exciting trips in order to enhance their curriculum across Years 7 to 11. Some of these include STEM visits, Geography fieldwork, the English curriculum visits to Whitby and the Globe Theatre, the history fieldwork at Hardwick Hall . Religious Studies visits to places of worship, including churches, mosques and Synagogues. With many others coming from PE, Music and Drama.

Some of our most popular and longstanding trips, running each year, are the ski trip to Austria, which encompasses the stunning views of the Austrian Alps. Our Sports tours in Football and Netball have travelled across Europe since 2013, our pupil's have represented us in Greece, Spain, Italy and Portugal, visiting the stadium's of Europe's biggest teams such as Porto, Barcelona, Real Madrid and AC Milan. The French trip to help our pupils develop confidence with listening and speaking French alongside experiencing the French culture.



## CHARACTER EDUCATION

Over your time at The Snaith School, we want pupils to reflect on their Character and Personal Development in order to be in a position to flourish in the wider world. Throughout the 5 years at Snaith, form time provides opportunities for students to develop their personal excellence to sit alongside their academic successes.

In Year 7, Pupils prepare for life at Snaith with our motto of ready, respectful and safe. In Year 8 and 9, they explore a wide range of careers as well as building resilience and being organised ready for GCSE. In Year 10 there is work experience preparation as well as the How to Revise programme to help with their end of year assessments. Year 11, is all about CV preparation, college applications yet also the skills needed to be successful and manage their emotions for GCSE.

On leaving the Snaith School. we want our pupils to be prepared for life. Be this an interview for college or an apprenticeship, applying for jobs or university or simply securing a Saturday job.

We provide a range of opportunities so that pupils are well rounded individuals with: resilience, empathy, organisation, confidence and community at heart.
